Introduction

Wolfgang Luh first visited the Czech Republic, and the city of Český Krumlov, in June, 2005. This was upon being awarded his Moldau scholarship from the state of Hesse, which was sponsored by the "Hessian Ministry of Science and Art" in Wiesbaden, Germany.

Together with Doris Jensen, his partner and fellow artist, Luh lived and worked for four weeks in the "Egon Schiele Art Centre" of Český Krumlov.

Towards the end of their stay in Český Krumlov, they met Miroslav Páral. Even after their first conversation and exchange of catalogues, an especially positive and creative bond had already been established between the three artists.

Miroslav Páral invited Wolfgang Luh to take part in the international art project "International Sculpture Symposium", to be held in Český Krumlov in July, 2006. In response, Luh told him about his so-called "world art project", ART OVER THE CITY, which had already been actualised three times. At that time,

ART OVER THE CITY IV was being prepared in Kassel.

With ART OVER THE CITY, a certain number of coloured, helium balloons are launched on their collective flight into the sky above the city where the launching takes place. One small work of art and some brief information about the project is attached to each of these balloons, in a sealed, transparent plastic folder. Each work or art is an original, created by an artist specifically for this flight.

Miroslav Páral was automatically enthralled by the project and suggested that ART OVER THE CITY be held in Český Krumlov. Wolfgang Luh agreed and the initial central themes and goals were then quickly found and put into action.

The launch was to take place on April 29, 2006, the opening day of the Cultural Season of the City of Český Krumlov, from the the main square of Český Krumlov. 2000 balloons with 2000 artistic messages were to be let loose and an exhibition, consisting of one work of art from each of the participating artists, was to be held in the "Gallery of Czech Culture" located on the second castle yard of the State Castle and Chateau of Cesky Krumlov.

This is how it came to be that 100 international artists were to be invited to take part in this project. Each participant was to be asked to create 21 small works to contribute to the project. 20 of these works were to be sent on the joint flight and one work was to be kept aside for the exhibition.

The conception, along with its accompanying message, thus came into being.

Conception

Český Krumlov is a city with a long cultural history. Having emerged and developed through the influence of many different cultures, the city has weathered many regimes and become symbolic of the ability to go beyond borders

Today, the city is proof that "East and West" and "black and white" need not prevail, that borders can be overcome, and that some values, such as borders themselves, are transient.

Český Krumlov has, in this way, become a symbol of hope, brought about from the past, for the present and the future. As a result, strangers are able to become friends.

In this city, which intellectually represents the unity of the past and the present for the people who live there and their cultures, the idea of solidarity and freedom exists, without shadows, borders or fear.

The international art project ART OVER THE CITY V is being launched as a signal from Český Krumlov, for the world. It is a project that both represents an example and sets one -an example of the idea of common freedom and security, created by 100 artists, from throughout the world, for the entire world.

2000 coloured balloons, carrying 2000 ideas, from 100 artists, as symbols of our greatest hopes and desires, are being launched from Český Krumlov into the world.

During this act, 2000 ideas are to become one idea. 2000 pictures are to become one picture.

One picture, consisting of 2000 pictures, created by 100 artists, is to become proof that, if we all work together, we can realise the wish for unity, freedom and security, for all people.

100 artists, from all six continents of our world, each with 21 small, autographed, original works, will be invited to take part in this collaborative example-setting action.

20 of the total 21 entries of each participating artist will then, along with information about the project, be placed in clear plastic folders, which will then be sealed.

Next, the 2000 plastic folders will be attached to special balloon strings, which will be tied to 2000 coloured, helium balloons on the launching day.

As some of the packages of art are relatively heavy, all of the balloons are exceptionally large, with a diameter of 45 cm.

On launching day, the balloons, carrying their artistic messages, will be gathered together under one large net, and then sent off together on their flight above the city and into the world.

Each person who discovers one of these 2000 flying objects with its artistic freight will become the owner of that piece of art and thereby an additional witness to ART OVER THE CITY.

One of the 21 works of each of the participating artists will be kept and presented in a group exhibition to be held in the Chateau of Český Krumlov.

Message

ART OVER THE CITY is meant to be a symbol for the fact that we, as people, still hope, dream and strive to live and work peacefully together in the world, and that, moreover, this common dream, with all of our help, can be realised.

ART OVER THE CITY is an example, thought out by 100 artists, that proves that many ideas from many different artists really can become one, can join together and become one idea. Furthermore, this one idea can connect, mix in, and also become one with its environment.

This means that if the world in which we live is a self-contained dimension, and it can be assumed that each picture is not only a reflection of this dimension, but also, in itself, a representation of a second dimension, then the connection between both dimensions will lead to a third dimension.

Yet, if many artists with many ideas, or pictures, take part in this project, and each one of these pictures represents its own dimension, imagine how many dimensions will coincide, blend together, and create new dimensions within the so-called first dimension, our real world.

ART OVER THE CITY offers all invited and participating artists the opportunity to become voices for peaceful unity in this one world of ours, and representatives of all people.

ART OVER THE CITY is proof that all of our ideas and hopes can be realised by all of us.

Chronology

The first of these projects, ART OVER THE CITY I, took place in 1986, in the Schloßberg (Castle) of Marburg, in Hesse, Germany. During that event, 1000 balloons, carrying 1000 works of art created by Wolfgang Luh, were set off on one collective flight. The title of the act was ART OVER THE CITY ART OUT OF THE AIR.

1996 was the year of ART OVER THE CITY II. It was carried out in the Avenida San Juan, in Buenos Aires, Argentina under the Spanish title ARTE SOBRE LA CIUDAD. 2000 balloons, with 2000 works of art, from 20 artists, were launched that day in Buenos Aires on their collective flight over the city. Along with Wolfgang Luh, the following Argentinean artists participated in the event:
